

## What is a spiritual harvest and how can I achieve one?

Throughout the Bible, the harvest carries spiritual significance. It is used in parables (<u>Luke 8:4–8</u>) and as a metaphor for spiritual growth and health (<u>2 Corinthians 9:10</u>; <u>James 3:18</u>). The harvest has always been a beautiful and important part of life on earth, the time when the year's work bears fruit and the people are fed. It is symbolic of bounty, health and abundance. Israel celebrated the time of the harvest with a feast, appropriately called the Feast of Harvest (<u>Exodus 23:16</u>).

Jesus spoke of a spiritual harvest waiting to be reaped. As Jesus travelled, "he saw the crowds, [and] he had compassion for them, because they were harassed and helpless, like sheep without a shepherd. Then he said to his disciples, 'The harvest is plentiful, but the labourers are few; therefore pray earnestly to the Lord of the harvest to send out labourers into his harvest'" (Matthew 9:36–38). Here, Jesus referred to the many souls needing to be brought to repentance and faith as a harvest waiting to be realized.

Jesus used the same metaphor of a spiritual harvest in Samaria. After talking to the <u>woman at the well</u>, Jesus told His disciples, "Don't you have a saying, 'It's still four months until harvest'? I tell you, open your eyes and look at the fields! They are ripe for harvest" (<u>John 4:35</u>). In the days following this statement, many of the Samaritans became believers in Christ (verse 41). Jesus saw the spiritual harvest of souls awaiting in that village.

A spiritual harvest is the result of God's work in the heart of man. It is clear from the <u>parable of the seed and the sower</u> that some people's hearts are good soil; when the Word of God is sown there, the person accepts it and continues to mature (<u>Luke 8:9–15</u>). There is nothing we can do to change the soil—that is God's job (<u>Ezekiel 36:26</u>). However, we can be faithful to sow the seed, help the plants to grow, or reap the harvest. The process of spiritual growth and maturity, from the heart's regeneration to the recognition of faith, is often a long journey. In fact, the Bible indicates that the sower, the tender, and the reaper are likely to be

different people at different times (John 4:35-38; 1 Corinthians 3:6-9).


Just like the physical growth of a field, the spiritual growth of people is a natural, organic process, overseen by God Himself. If we don't see anyone getting saved, it can be discouraging, but we need to remember that sowing is just as important as reaping. Some of us are sowers and may never see the result of our labour. That is why our focus should be on pleasing the One who sent us into the field rather than on controlling the rate of growth or the amount we reap.

God's labourers in the spiritual harvest of souls are promised great reward for their faith and perseverance (James 1:12; 1 Peter 5:4; 2 Timothy 4:8; Hebrews 11). This applies to all aspects of our spiritual lives, including witnessing and seeing people saved and growing in the Lord, which is the spiritual harvest we all long to see. Sometimes we don't see it. Nonetheless, believers are exhorted with these words: "Let us not grow weary of doing good, for in due season we will reap, if we do not give up" (Galatians 6:9) and "A harvest of righteousness is sown in peace by those who make peace" (James 3:18) and "Those who go out weeping, carrying seed to sow, will return with songs of joy, carrying sheaves with them" (Psalm 126:6).


Jesus told us to pray to the Lord of the harvest for more labourers (Matthew 9:38). We should pray about all aspects of the spiritual harvest process, including the preparation of the soil. We can ask God to change people's hearts. "The Lord's servant must not be quarrelsome but kind to everyone, able to teach, patiently enduring evil, correcting his opponents with gentleness. God may perhaps grant them repentance leading to a knowledge of the truth" (2 Timothy 2:24–25). God will use us in His fields, each according to our gifts and the need of the moment, as we trust Him.



# Blessed are the peacemakers, for they will be called children of God (Matthew 5:9), by Inderjit Bhogal

Essential to the things that make for peace are peacemakers. Peacemakers are blessed by Jesus. Their blessing is that Jesus calls them "children of God".

Neither the title "peacemakers" nor the title "children of God" are selfdesignations. However, you can choose to be a peacemaker. Peacemakers strive and aim for healing, not harming, and will always seek non-violent solutions to conflict.

Peace-making is not a popular task, nor is it an easy or a soft option. Peacemakers often attract hostility. Peace making is tough, and more difficult than making conflict or inflicting violence. Jesus was a peacemaker and is the Christian pattern and example to follow. He is described as "our peace", making peace by breaking down dividing walls of segregation and hostility (Ephesians 2:14). He taught his followers to love their neighbours, to "love your enemies and pray for those who persecute you, so that you may be children of your Father in heaven" (Matthew 5:44, 45).

Twice in Matthew Chapter 5, those who work for peace are called "children" of God. What this means is that you most closely reflect the nature and character of God, the great Peacemaker, when you are a peacemaker. God is the God of peace. All the great religions of the world teach this be they Bahai, Buddhist, Christian, Hindu, Jain, Judaism, Islam, Sikh or Zoroastrian.

In God's wisdom human beings are made in "the Image and likeness of God", but not the same. Human beings are made in the Image of God but are marked by their immense differences.

This is what makes us beautiful, but herein also lies the route to our brokenness. Brokenness and conflict arise when instead of valuing differences as gift and strength, they are seen as things to be feared and generate hostility. We can see this in all conflict in the world. Conflict arises when differences of appearance or opinions are seen as a problem rather than an enrichment.

Peace-making is essentially about valuing differences and diversity of opinions, facilitating deep and respectful listening to all views without rubbishing or dehumanising or humiliating anyone. Peace-making is rooted in seeing and valuing the Image of God in all people, including those who may revile or persecute you, and who may see you as their "enemy".

Peace-making means you listen and enable listening however much you dislike what is being said, and asking questions that seek greater clarity in what is being said, and often this helps to see strengths and weaknesses in points raised. This is frequently the way to achieving shared strategic wisdom and ways forward.

Maya Angelou, the African American writer and poet says, that parents should teach children early that there is a beauty and strength in diversity. The Rev Dr Martin Luther King was often heard saying "I have a dream that one day this nation will rise up and live out the true meaning of it's creed that all people are made equal". Not same, equal.

Saint Oscar Romero, who was Archbishop of El Salvador, at the height of the civil war in his country used to tell the soldiers in his country not to kill people because they were only killing their own brothers and sisters. He was seen as such a threat for preaching peace that he was assassinated, shot dead in March 1980 as he lifted the bread and wine at a service of Holy Communion.

The one who most closely portrays God, according to the New Testament, is Jesus who is "our peace". How does Jesus make peace? By removing dividing walls of hatred. By bringing hostile people together. He paid for this with his life (Ephesians 2:13).

The word translated "peacemaker" means being active in holding people together. Peacemakers see the Image of God in all people, they live on a larger map, see the bigger picture, treat all people equally, and so they reflect the nature and character of God.

The world needs more peacemakers. Be a Peacemaker, in your congregation, in your school and community, in your home, in your workplace and playground, in your neighbourhood, in your nation, in the world.

Peacemakers are ordinary, vulnerable people. They try to live with a purity of heart, which most importantly means, with a capacity to see the Image of God in all people, not least in those who look, and think, and speak differently. This requirement goes deep into the need for honesty, humility and integrity in relationships, and clarity and focus in thought and being. It calls on you to pray for others, including your enemies and those who revile you or persecute you. It calls on you to always strive, do your uttermost, to aim at healing, never at harming.

Make sure that your morality, ethics and attitudes are defined by the values of God seen in the life and teachings of Christ and all he called "children of God".





## \* Methodist Conference: Revising The Methodist Worship Book

The Methodist Conference, meeting in Telford, has voted to revise the Church's authorised liturgies. This decision sets in motion a major project to equip the Church with new and revised liturgical resources, available in a wide variety of formats, including digital and printed versions.

The first stage of the process is to consider the style and language to be used in the resources, in order to enable the Church's worship to be as inclusive as possible, in line with the Conference's commitments in its strategy for Justice, Dignity and Solidarity.

The report outlined a rolling programme of renewing existing authorised liturgy while consideration is given to what needs to be resourced with authorised liturgy and what can be appropriately resourced in other ways. There will also be consideration of what it might mean for a liturgical resource no longer to be authorized.

The Conference voted to adopt the principle that authorised liturgy is defined as that which has been authorised by the Conference, rather than that which is contained in a particular book. This will mean resources can be produced in formats, digital and print, according to needs which may vary through the life of the resource. The work will also consider what happens to official texts when they have been superseded.

Discussions have already been held with the Methodist Survivors' Advisory Group and Solidarity Circles for Disability and for Women who have indicated that the needs and patterns of the Methodist Church are changing and are likely to change yet further over time.

All resources are expected to be made available online in formats appropriate to their use, for example PowerPoint presentations, Word documents and ready-to-print PDFs. Rather than produce a single book

containing everything, it is intended that booklet versions be produced that contain liturgies regularly used in local churches or where it may be convenient for ministers and others engaged in pastoral ministry to be able to carry copies.

It was agreed that details should be brought to the Conference in 2026 seeking to set out principles along with an outline of the plan of work and revision.

Should the 2026 Conference adopt the report, the expectation is that the first new liturgies to be commended for experimental use will be brought to the Conference of 2028, and formally authorised in 2030.

The Revd Dr Mark Rowland, Secretary of the Faith and Order Committee commented, "To embark upon a revision of our authorised liturgy is a significant task. It is the committee's hope that the way forward provides a suitable way in which we may serve the present, and future ages, and fulfil our calling."
